Defining Character Development

Character development is the process of creating and growing a character over the course of a story. This includes the way that a character changes, develops, and reacts to events as they happen throughout the story. It is important to identify the different stages of a character's development and understand how their actions impact the story.

The Different Types of Characters

There are different types of characters that you will encounter in a story:

- Protagonist: This is the main character in the story. The story usually revolves around them.
- Antagonist: This is the character that opposes the protagonist in the story.
- Secondary Characters: These are characters that support the main characters in the story. Although they are not as important as the protagonist and antagonist, they are still essential to move the story forward.

The Different Stages of Character Development

5. Resolution: This is the stage where the story comes to an end. The author usually ties up any loose ends and provides a conclusion to the story.
